Ziel Karapotó (born in the Karapotó Terra Nova community, City of São Sebastião, State of Alagoas, 1994, and resident in the Marataro Kaetés Indigenous Reserve, City of Igarassu, State of Pernambuco) is graduated in Visual Arts from the Federal University of Pernambuco and a multi-artist, curator and audiovisual director. He was one of three indigenous artists chosen to represent Brazil at the 60th Venice Biennale in 2024 with an installation titled "Schooling fish II", and also nominated for the PIPA prize in the same year. Curator of the Indigenous Museum of the Lagoa Queimada Archaeological Site, City of Santa Inês, Bahia state, Ziel Karapotó was part of the research groups "Indigenous Science and Art in the Northeast" (CAIN-UFPE) and "Anti-Racism Cultures in Latin America" (CARLA UFBA). His artist path is marked by productions and performances in visual arts and audiovisual on the national and international scene. Ziel Karapotó's work and research addresses indigenous poetics, identity configurations and racism regarding original ethnicities, especially indigenous peoples in the Northeast.




